
Condition & Reserve Study:

In July we mailed questionnaires to each unit owner requesting information about leaks and other signs of needed repair. 68 questionnaires were returned and given to Ralph Noblin Associates for review. The on-site inspection has begun and we are bracing ourselves for their report. It will assess the condition of each building, prioritize needed repairs, and provide us with the information we will need to formulate a long range plan for maintaining the buildings and facilities of Springbrook.

Trash Pickup:

P & T Container Service Co. is under contract to empty our dumpsters once a week. They do not remove any trash that is left outside of the dumpster. When one of your neighbors leaves a piece of furniture. a mattress, or other trash at the dumpster area, we must hire someone to pick it up and remove it. If you see someone dumping such trash at the dumpster, please discourage their doing so. If identified, we will charge them for the cost of removal, otherwise, the rest of us must pay the bill.

P.S. Did you know that our recycling program is voluntary and that we have a high rate of participation? Remember: bottles, cans, and newspapers, go in the bins on the back wall of the dumpster area. (They do not need to be separated.)



Commercial Vehicles:

We would like to remind the owners commercial and residents that vehicles (or any vehicle commercial tettering) are not allowed on the property. If you have such a vehicle and are not aware of the Springbrook rules and regulations regarding commercial vehicles. please review your condo "docs" or phone the commons for additional information.
