Lost and Found:

Recycling:

We recently reassessed the use of "toters" at the dumpsters. There are 6 toters at each dumpster. Historically, there have been 3 each for newspapers and commingled recyclables. It seemed evident that we needed more for commingled and less for the newspapers. Accordingly, we have changed the labels and now have, at each dumpster, 2 toters for newspapers and 4 toters for commingled.

Recycling Guidelines: <u>Acceptable</u> for Mixed

Paper toters:

Newspapers
Old mail
Magazines
Phonebooks
Catalogs
Greeting cards
Brochures
Flyers
Paper bags
Folders
Cereal boxes (w/o liner)
Shoe boxes
Paper towel rolls
Pizza boxes (w/o liner)

Not Acceptable for paper toters:

Plastic bags Waxed paper Tissues

Recycling Guidelines (continued): Acceptable for

<u>Acceptable</u> for Commingled toters:

Glass food and beverage containers: clear glass, brown glass, green & blue glass - well rinsed.

Plastic soft drink and liquor bottles, milk, water, and juice jugs, Laundry detergent and bleach bottles - well rinsed.

Metal (aluminum)cans, Tin cans, aluminum pie tins and foil, aerosol cans (empty and nonpaint-or-pesticide) wellrinsed.

Not Acceptable for Comingled toters:

Ceramic cups and plates
Drinking glasses
Heat resistant ovenware
Light bulbs
Mirror & window glass
Dairy container lids/caps
Plastic "silverware"
Paint cans
Gas cans
and.....
no plastic grocery bags.
(Note: That means we
have to empty the items
from plastic bags into
the toter.)
